"Interpretive Rules" and "Policy Statements"

Not binding on the agency or regulated persons.

Agencies may reference guidance in notices and decisions, but a person cannot violate guidance.



Oregon defines "rule" to include policy statements and interpretive rules (ORS 183.310)(9)).

Washington defines interpretive rules and policy statements differently from "rule" (RCW 34.05.010).



Washington (RCW 34.05.230)

- Encourages interpretive rules and policy statements.
- Must publish a statement describing the subject matter in the Washington State Register.
- Encourages converting interpretive rules and policy statements into rules.



Easier for an agency to issue guidance than a rule.

Alerts the public.

- Most people comply.
- Agency does not need to take an individualized action to implement policy.
- No surprises.

Uniform application of law.



Public input not required, so input often comes in the form of litigation.

Agencies may treat guidance as binding.

Agencies can decide not to rely on guidance without notice and comment, except where a person has relied on the guidance to his or her detriment.
